Made redundant on closure of Social Science Research Council Survey Unit in September 1976.

Appointed Oct 1976 at top of Principal Lecturer scale to design and run the **Social Research and Planning Option** of a proposed new four-year degree BA (Hons) Applied Social Studies, the other option being in Social Work.

This option was designed from scratch under my direction and received CNAA approval in May 1977. It has been recognised since its inception as providing exemption from professional examinations for the Diploma of the Market Research Society. The option was revalidated in 1982 and 1986 and continued virtually unchanged into the new Faculty Modular Scheme as a pathway in Social Research with a target intake of 25 students per year. Although I gave up overall responsibility for the option in 1980 in order to devote more time to the development of research and graduate studies, I have been closely associated with its administration and development throughout. Indeed it was my own PNL and externally funded research staff who kept it viable and around whom the option built its enviable reputation and accolades from CNAA and HMI. I was Admissions Tutor for the option throughout and continued in this capacity, and also as Assessment Tutor, for the new modular scheme.

Established [Survey Research Unit](#) in May 1978 around a group of research staff and on the basis of substantial external funding. Set up post-graduate level specialist courses in Survey Analysis and Survey Research Practice which ran continuously from 1976 to 1992 and attracted 30+ students each semester, generating significant revenue.

Member 1976-1980 of Polytechnic Research Cttee and 1976 onwards of Departmental and Faculty Cttees covering Research, Staff Development and Information Technology. Chair of Joint Validation Panel for BA Modern Studies.

Responsible for Research Degree students in Dept of Applied Social Studies and Dept of Sociology from 1984 onwards and Research Degrees Tutor for the Faculty of Social Studies from October 1987 to June 1990.

Teaching responsibilities in area of research methods generally, but mainly in statistics, computing and questionnaire surveys. Also placement finding, placement supervision and dissertation supervision for students on Social Research option; supervision of students registered for MPhil and PhD by research. Liaison with Market Research Society for students registered for their professional Diploma.

As Director of the Survey Research Unit I was responsible for a total research budget of more than £1,300,000 since 1976 of which over £1 million was externally funded, the rest being made up from a variety of internal ILEA funded research posts which were obtained in competition via the Polytechnic's own procedures.

Much of my time was spent drafting or commenting on research and research funding proposals, costing, management, meeting deadlines, recruiting and training research staff, co-ordinating research bids (eg ESRC Research Initiatives) giving advice on commissioning research, acting as agent for research, getting value for money, chasing money, and on all aspects of research support and administration both within and without the Polytechnic.

Survey for SSRC Next 30 Years Committee, Comparison of mass and élite expectations and evaluations of possible changes in the next 15 years.

**Quality of Life in Britain** (1971 – 75)

This series of surveys pioneered the British end of collaborative surveys with the ISR Survey Research Center (University of Michigan, Ann Arbor) to develop survey-based [subjective social indicators](#). Mark Abrams and I worked together on this series throughout and although the work ceased when the Unit was closed in 1976, much secondary analysis has occurred and the methodology has underpinned much later work in Britain and elsewhere.

Responsible for two major surveys for SSRC (and DES). Although both these projects were discontinued when the Unit closed in 1976, it was my archiving and documentation which enabled them to be resurrected for deposit at the ESRC Data Archive several years later.

### **SSRC and DES award-holders** (1970-76)

Longitudinal survey of the subsequent careers of around 9,000 SSRC and DES award-holders. I worked with John Utting on research and questionnaire design, logistics, and did all the computer processing and statistical analysis. When SSRC decided to close the SU, the planned 6<sup>th</sup> wave was cancelled (on dubious advice from another statistician, possibly politically motivated). Dr Norman Perry then wrote reports which helped form future SSRC award policy. Little of this survey ever became public, but one major finding was that, when it came to future earning power, a First was worth more than a PhD.

### **Funded social research in the UK**

Very large survey of every academic, commercial and independent research organisation in the UK to ascertain the extent and nature of their externally funded social research. I worked with John Utting on research and questionnaire design, logistics, and did all the computer processing and statistical analysis. Again, mostly internal reports for SSRC. but there is a published report: Norman Perry ***The Organisation of Social Science Research in the United Kingdom*** (Occasional Papers in Survey Research No 6, SSRC Survey Unit, 1975) and a book: Elizabeth T Crawford and Norman Perry, [Demands for Social Knowledge](#) (Sage 1976).

She went straight from SSRC/SU to a Lectureship in Social and Political Sciences at Cambridge, and later to a personal Chair at Manchester, where the Cathie Marsh Centre for Census and Survey Research is now named after her.

### **Colin Brown,**

(Appointed 1975: his first research post on graduation from Sussex)  
Colin worked on the Quality of Life surveys and put up an impressive defence to the full Council against the decision to close down the SU. He went straight from SSRC/SU to Researcher with the Consumer Association, then Research Fellow at Policy Studies Institute, and was later Policy Director, Office of Fair Trading.

Oversight of SSRC/SU fieldwork subcontracted to outside agencies (approx £350,000 at 1976 prices)

The list of SSRC Survey Unit clients ran into hundreds over the six years I was there.

When SSRC decided to close the Survey Unit in 1976, I was made redundant. Fortunately I obtained a new post at the Polytechnic of North London, where the experience gained was invaluable in building up externally funded research work and eventually establishing my own Survey Research Unit in 1978, and in designing undergraduate training courses in research methods.
